### **Gardens and Alpines of New Zealand**

with Mark Akimoff, owner Illahe Rare Plants



Mark will cover the gardens and wild places of New Zealand that he visited from mid December 2022 to early January 2023. His botanical explorations ranged from Auckland to Queenstown on the South Island and back to Auckland, driving some 1,500 km. Frequent trips into the Southern Alps and the Grampian Mountains on the South Island and the Volcanic Tongariro National Park on the North Island revealed scores of great alpine plants to photograph. In between, Mark and his companion visited

every botanic garden and some wonderful private gardens, as well as some amazing crevice gardens. The diversity of climates and habitats they visited made for a wonderful botanical experience, from alpines on rocky crags between glacier carved peaks in the Southern Alps, to ferns and dense rainforests of the subtropical North island's Waitekere Ranges. New Zealand's remarkable alpine flora, friendly people, and wonderful gardens made it an amazing adventure.

Mark is a specialty grower of flower bulbs, geophytes, alpines, and rock garden plants from around the world.

"These are Aizoaceae and are native to South Africa. They are long lived if you have the right system. They need to be three years old to bloom. My understanding is to keep them dry in the winter and err on the side of dryness if you are in doubt any other time of the year. I have heard they need a pot at least 5 inches deep."


On a recent visit to Mendocino Coast Botanical Gardens in Fort Bragg she saw the gardener using some kind of contraption on the Dahlias. He had a long PVC tube with a blade set inside near the end and attached to a shop vacuum. He put the tube over a flower, jerked it up to cut the stem with the blade, and the bloom was vacuumed up. He could reach deep into the beds with this device and work very quickly.



### Streptocarpus 'Cape Primrose'

"I got this one and some others from the San Mateo Garden Center. They have a little place where they sell plants that people leave there, so it's kind of like buying a pig in a poke. These are in the family Gesneriaceae. They do well for me, blooming throughout the year. I have them outdoors in a container in a shadier spot."
