

## Cestrum newellii



"I have two of these. One is shaded by a fence in winter. The other is exposed to sun. The one with sun exposure began to bloom a couple of weeks before the one in the shade. This photo is of flowers on the shaded shrub."







#### Per Devil Mountain Wholesale Nursery:

"An arching, perennial, evergreen shrub with velvety, gray green leaves. Ornamental berries follow the blossoms that bloom from spring through fall. Flowers are crimson red, long, tubular, and tightly clustered. Beneficial for butterflies and hummingbirds. Light Needs: Full Sun, Filtered Sun, Partial Sun, Partial Shade, Shade; Water Needs: Regular"



## Lachenalias









Lachenalia viridifolia with turquoise flowers

Lachenalias are showy bulbous plants that are usually native to Namibia and South Africa. They are dormant in the summer and active in the cool, wet season.

## Adenium obesum Desert Rose

Adenium is native to dry desert areas of Africa, Asia and Tanzania.

This plant survives drought with a thick caudex where it stores moisture and nutrients.

Related to Oleanders, also in the Apocynaceae, it shares similar flowers and its poisonous properties. Give it plenty of sun and good drainage and enjoy its interesting form and flowers.






## Evergreen, winter blooming, Clematis

This Clematis is from Kristin Yanker-Hansen

We found on Gardenia.net what looks like the plant: Clematis cirrhosa var. purpurascens 'Freckles'. Evergreen clematis with fragrant creamy white bell-shaped flowers, spotted with dark red spots and streaks.

## Phlox drummondii





Native to Texas and it is considered an annual. Named after Thomas Drummond a Scottish Botanist that brought seeds back to Britain in 1833-1835



"Phlox drummondii is sold as a Spring and Autumn blooming plant. I have tried to convince the retail Nurseries that they should ask for it to be made available for the winter, but they feel they do not have the ability to influence the growers. It is a consistent winter bloomer for me having survived frosts down to 24° F."

### **Bromeliads in the Garden**







"These two Bromeliads are generally sold as house plants. The left one is a Vriesia. Last Spring I decided to reduce the number of protected plants due to lack of space. Rather than throwing them out, I decided to try them in the garden and see if they would winter over. So far they continue to bloom and are doing well."

## Bromeliads in the Garden continued







"This Aechmea, Aechmea recurvata is always an early bloomer for me. It has survived much colder temps than we have now. At least 20° F. They are in a water garden and are multiplying a lot. I can never remember the name."

"I initially saw this Billbergia vittata cultivar in the home of Jack Halpern. It was a winter blooming one, and he gave me a piece. It has done extremely well surviving much colder temps than we are having now."

#### Aloes in the Garden

"I have many different Aloes, but since they rarely bloom, I didn't bother maintaining their tags. The first one is Aloe ferox for sure. I found out from Jason Samson years ago when he was here that it is the best Aloe for healing This is the first time it has bloomed. Don't know the names of the other two. I assume that they are blooming because we are having an exceptionally mild winter this year, with the lowest temp being 27° F. "




#### **An Unusual Acanthus**

"Acanthus sennii is a good winter bloomer for me. I think I need to find a place to give it more sun. I tried to plant it in a dry location last year during the rainy season, but it did not survive."

Native to the highlands of Ethiopia, where the rainy season is mid-June to Mid- September so it evidently does like some summer water and decent drainage. This unusual Acanthus has interesting textural quality with a distinctive silver vein down the middle of each armed leaf and red flowers. The Secret Garden Grower's website describes this plant as "A great selection for beneath your teenage daughter's window". This shrub grows about 3-5 feet tall.





Cal Hort brings the coffee and tea Potluck on the morning snacks






#### February meeting:









Plant Diversity in Oaxaca, Mexico with Troy Stevens, plant grower, collector, and enthusiast

Date: Monday, February 19<sup>th</sup> Via Zoom – 6:30 plant forum, 7 pm featured presentation

There isn't another place in North America with a higher rate of biodiversity and density of ecotypes than Oaxaca, Mexico. Oaxaca is full of almost any kind of plant you can imagine; from palms and cycads, to ferns and aroids, and of course cacti and succulents.
