# Cal Hort Meeting, Monday, February 19, 6:30 p.m. via Zoom or by phone

Plant Diversity in Oaxaca, Mexico

with Troy Stevens, Plant grower, collector, and enthusiast



There isn't another place in North America with a higher rate of biodiversity and density of ecotypes than Oaxaca, Mexico. With everything from summer monsoonal desert basins, to cool and moist cloud forest, Oaxaca is full of almost any kind of plant you can imagine: from palms and cycads, to ferns and aroids, and of course cacti and succulents. Troy got the opportunity to explore the northern part of the state and observe a selection of the peculiar plants that grow there. His presentation will be from the perspective of someone getting into the field for the first time.

Troy is a plant grower, collector, and enthusiast from Alameda, California, who has been growing succulents and other plants for "some time now." He is a manager/plant buyer at the Grand Lake Ace Garden Center in Oakland, a perennial volunteer at the Gardens at Lake Merritt, and one of the Board

J eff Harter and I staffed the Cal Hort membership table and rock painting station at the February 3 Seeds of Connection event, hosted by the Ruth Bancroft Garden. The hall was packed with all sorts of interesting plant enthusiasts and organizations. There were local garden clubs, the S.F. Succulent and Cactus Society, the Bromeliad Society, the Herb Society, Roger's Ranch, the Orchid Society, the California Native Plant Society, U.C. Master Gardeners, the American Iris Society, and Bay Area Basket Makers. It was great to see a lot of familiar faces and meet new friends as well. When horticulturally-minded people get together, there is always something to talk about. There were so many great organizations, each focusing on one aspect of the plant world—something for everyone.

It was a well attended event and we were quite fortunate to be allowed two tables —in the middle of the hall, a prime spot—to display our materials and offer rock painting. Jeff and his wife Judy created a new outreach brochure for the occasion which we handed out.

While chatting with us about Cal Hort, folks created many really lovely and interesting rocks. One couple showed me how to paint the Chinese characters for "good luck" and "Spring". They also inspired a few folks to paint dragons in honor of the Year of the Dragon, and they even left a drawing that people could copy.

We were lucky that the event landed between storms, since I think more people visited, and it made the garden a joy to walk after the event. It was just beautiful, as usual, with lots of Aloes in bloom right now including a vibrant *Aloe marlothii*. A spectacular *Templetonia retusa*, a shrub with which I was unfamiliar, was full of tomato-red pea-like flowers. On the east side of the garden I made another surprising discovery—Ruth Bancroft's personal iris collection is currently in full view. The staff has cut the oleander hedge down to knee-height, clearing the view to Ruth's meticulously documented collection. I fully recommend that you plan a visit in April when they should be in full bloom.

Overall, the day went well, we had a great time, met new people, and made some good connections.

## The Calochortus of California

with **Kipp McMichael**, active contributor of the Pacific Bulb Society, hortiphile, software developer



The Bay Area is the center of diversity for the genus Calochortus, and California is home to the lion's share of species is in this group of "beautiful grasses." These members of the lily tribe grow

throughout the state, from alpine meadows to seaside bluffs and from the desert to the temperate rain forest. Kipp will orient Calochortus in the larger scheme of plant taxonomy, discuss the biogeography of the genus, present a photo tour of species starting with Bay Area taxa and moving north, east, and south, based on his photos and observations from years of calochovorting about the state in search of these entrancing beauties. He will talk about more far-flung members of the genus outside California and the U.S. and conclude with a discussion of the cultivation of this genus, many of whose members are surprisingly easy to grow.

Kipp McMichael is a software developer and hortiphile who makes his home and garden in Berkeley, where he resides with husbands Patrick and Jean-Claude, as well as far too many succulents, cacti, and geophytes. Kipp has a lifelong interest in all kinds of natural history and has relished the biological and geological richness of the California landscape since he moved here in 2000. He has grown most of the Calochortus species native to California from seed and loves to cultivate appreciation of this cult-worthy genus.
