# Introduction to Ethnobotany with Dr. David Pepper, MD

From childhood and family custom, Dr. David Pepper was destined to dabble in herbs and other plants, an orientation which found resonance in his medical practice. Many, even most of the drugs we use arise from plants' roots, leaves, and shoots, along with such organisms as molds and fungi. Even more broadly, for both our ancestors and ourselves, these same non-animal life forms are the source of food, shelter, and well-being, including the current resurgence of interest in psychedelic compounds.

With so much of modern life finding its origin in plants, Dr. Pepper will discuss indigenous American practices —today, at our remove, categorized as ethnobotany—along with current practices to provide benefits to our lives from botanical sources.

David Pepper is a semi-retired Family Physician who for more than thirty years practiced and taught Family Medicine with UCSF. His work ranged rom delivering babies to assisting hundreds at the end of their lives, with a vast variety of medical approaches—ER, Obstetrics, Hospital and Clinic Medicine— always with a bent toward prevention and Community Medicine. His "end game" combines his interest to help people die well, where most want to be (at home) and in relative tranquility.

# The Secret Season or Year-Round Food Gardening

with Pam Peirce, gardener, author, photographer, and lecturer

When Pam Peirce created a plan for planting a year-round food garden, she realized that gardeners often miss one of the resulting four seasons—January through March. She named it The Secret Season. It's a time in which rain will supplement or replace your watering efforts and when pests are least active. The resulting harvests will give you delicious garden produce long before your summer harvest is underway. Pam will show you what to plant (including some unusual choices), how to avoid having to garden on cold, rainy days, and special tips for the best use of our region's Secret Season.

Based in San Francisco, Pam Peirce is a gardener, author, photographer, and lecturer. The fourth (30th Anniversary) edition of her classic regional gardening book, *Golden Gate Gardening*, was published in August 2023. It teaches yearround food gardening in mediterranean California from the foggy coast of Eureka to San Luis Obispo, to hot inland climates like Walnut Creek or San Jose. Her book *Wildly Successful Plants* covers botany and best use of 50 plucky, historic, mid-California ornamentals.

Pam earned a BA in plant science, taught horticulture at City College of San Francisco for nearly 30 years, and lectures and writes widely on gardening and food issues. You can follow her future appearances on her website: pampeirce.com, which also provides a link to her blog.
